

# SO WHAT HAVE WE BEEN LEARNING THIS WEEK?

Our little learners have had the fantastic opportunity to visit Ryde library. When at the library the children were able to independently choose and look at the books, it was lovely to see the variety of choice, some children choosing stories and other information books. After we all listened together to the Librarian read a story. For our preschool children it was the first time they had been on the school mini bus and this was a very exciting experience. We showed we can be resilient to the change in routine and environment and also we can make it happen when taking part in activities to enriching our lives to the world around us.





Reception have had a busy week! Reception have been learning new phonemes and we have also begun blending some of our new phonemes! We have listened to the story of the 3 Little Pigs this week, making our own stories and puppets to retell the story. This has linked to our number learning as well. We have learnt about number 5 and begun consolidating our learning about numbers 1-5 a little more looking at patterns and ways to make these numbers. We have also been busy planting bulbs and making signs for our outdoor space, explaining what the flowers will be and also protecting our flowers.

It has been a wonderful week here in Rosen Class! This week we have spent a bit of time practising recognising and writing our tricky words using different games! In English we have been learning about adjectives.

Working in groups the children designed a new Gruffalo and came up with their own adjectives. The class then did some lovely writing where they changed the story of the Gruffalo and met some new animals along the way! In RE we spoke all about celebrations and what this means to us. The children then made some lovely invitations focussing on celebration to a Gruffalo party! We then went on to recognise how Christians celebrate Harvest and how it is important to them. We finished our work all about our locality in Geography and the class made a useful locality leaflet using the key words we learnt this term. Well done on your first term in Year 1! Have a lovely well deserved break!



This week has been another busy week in Year 2. We have visited the church to learn about how the church celebrates Harvest and what it means to Christians. In English, we have been writing our story of the Enormous Pumpkin. Our Science investigation has been based on answering the question: Which paper would be strong enough to use to wrap a present up to send as a parcel. In Maths, we have been continuing to compare numbers and order numbers from smallest to largest and then largest to smallest using number lines.

We have had a fun last week of term, bursting with interesting learning. We had a brilliant time in Geography with Mrs Feist, making our own volcano on the school field. As part of our RE day, we also really enjoyed exploring stories from different religions and thinking about the message behind each one. It was really fun to create our own stories with messages to act out for our friends too. All of this half term, Miss Beale has been reading us a very exciting book called The Ice Palace, where a boy, named Ivan, goes in search of his little brother, who has been stolen away by Starjik -a mysterious and malevolent creature. Finally, we finished the story on Thursday. Nobody had anticipated how it would end. It was amazing!





A busy week to the end of the term. This week we looked at the topic of temptation during our RE day discussing what temptation is and what is morally right to do. We looked at the stories of Jesus and the devil and the story of Moses and the golden calf. Non-fiction was the focus of our writing this week in English where we have worked hard to write a diary entry from a character's viewpoint using past and present perfect tense. We thoroughly enjoyed our workshop with Wessex river trust on Tuesday where we put all of our Geography learning into practice. We also learnt about flooding and the impact of rivers flooding on people and the environment in our Geography lesson this week. Subtraction was our focus this week involving 2 4-digit numbers

and how we exchange with larger numbers. A fantastic last week to the end of our first term in Year 4. On Tuesday, Blake Class had the exciting opportunity to visit the Isle of Wight Steam Railway. We learned about the history of the Island's railways, which will support our upcoming history topic on The Beeching Axe next half term. The visit also included a scenic round trip on the steam train, which we thoroughly enjoyed! Wednesday was our RE day, with a focus on the theme of belonging. We first explored what belonging means in our own lives and then we examined it from an Islamic perspective whilst exploring the festival of Eid. In Maths this week, Blake Class have been applying their prior knowledge of rounding to estimate answers for addition and subtraction problems. Well done Blake Class, we are super proud of your hard work this half term. We hope you have a safe and happy half term break!



This week in Year 6, we focused on laws, rules and rights as part of our Religious Education (R.E.) day. The title of our topic was: Jesus the law breaker. We explored the concept of laws in relation to our daily lives. We discussed the importance of laws in keeping us safe. We also explored the idea of 'rights'. We studied the United Nations Charter for Children's Rights and we discussed how laws can protect these very important rights. As part of our work on the idea of Jesus breaking the religious law of the Sabbath, we discussed the two great commandments: 'love the Lord with all your heart' and 'love your neighbour as yourself'.

# YEAR 3

**Talk to me about...**how stories are used by different religions to teach messages.

**Words to use...** The Parable of the Sower (Christianity), The Mustard Seed (Buddhism), The New Car (Islam).

**Tips for the week...** Using a story to exemplify a teaching is a powerful way of helping somebody to truly understand why it may be important to follow the message being taught.

We have been reading... The Ice Palace by Robert Swindells.

#### YEAR R

Talk to me about... coins and different sizes, shapes and colours of coins.

Words to use... Autumn, leaves, colours, trees, hibernation.

**Tips for the week...** to practise our rhymes, including our new rhyme Humpty Dumpty

**We have been reading...** Meg and Mog by Helen Nicoll and Jan Pienkowski.

#### YEAR 2

Talk to me about...ordering numbers.

**Words to use...** greater, greatest, tallest, most, less, least, shortest.

**Tips for the week....** Antarctica is the southernmost continent and it is the site of the South Pole. It is virtually uninhabited. It is covered in snow and ice.

We have been reading... The Enormous Turnip by Irene Yates and Charlie and the Chocolate Factory by Roald Dahl.

#### YEAR 4

**Talk to me about...** temptation, separating a sand, salt and water solution, river workshop, how rivers flood and the impact of flooding and subtracting 2 4-digit numbers.

**Words to use...** temptation, morals, flooding, impact, separation, subtraction and digit.

**Tips for the week...** continue to learn your times tables and common exception words.

We have been reading... The Lost Whale by Hannah Gold.

#### YEAR 5

Talk to me about... belonging.

Words to use... belonging, community, inclusion, Islam, Eid.

Tips for the week... Have a safe and happy half term break!

We have been reading... Lightening Mary by Anthea Simmons.

## YEAR 6

**Talk to me about...** the CPR training at Bembridge Fire Station. Ask me what the DRS ABC is.

**Words to use...** cardiopulmonary resuscitation, laws, rules, rights and remembrance.

**Tips for the week:...** keep reading and sharing your favourite books on Boom Reader!

**We have been reading...** Letters from the Lighthouse by Emma Carroll. What will life be like for Olive and Cliff in the lighthouse with Ephraim?

#### OUR YEAR 6 LEARN ABOUT HEALTHY CHOICES AND SAVING LIVES



Year 6 were invited to Bembridge Fire Station by ATCoRS (Ambulance Training and Community Response Services) to take part in CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) training. The training involved familiarisation with the acronym DRS ABC (Danger Response Shout for help Airway Breathing CPR). Once the children were familiar with the acronym, they had the opportunity to put it into practice with a mannequin. The class

was also shown a defibrillator. They were told how and when this important piece of equipment would be used. They were also shown how it would be used alongside CPR. The class knew that there is a defibrillator on the school wall. It was a very informative session and everyone learned an important skill.

# WE CAN MAKE HEALTHY CHOICES

Please can we alert parents that we have had a few confirmed cases of hand, foot and mouth disease in school over the last week.

Whilst this sounds super nasty NHS and public health advice shares that children can return to school following diagnosis should they feel well enough to do so.

Over the half term break please be alert to symptoms including; sore throat, temperature and your child not wanting to eat as it could be that they have contracted the disease.

The second stage manifests as mouth ulcers and a raised rash that can appear on the hands and feet and also sometimes the groin or bottom area.

# KEEPING CHILDREN SAFE AT HALLOWEEN



Whilst celebrating Halloween can be really exciting and fun for many families, the concept of scary stuff, frightening images, costumes and masks can be really distressing for others.

Please see our trick or treating safety tips to help you enjoy the event safely.

- Trick or treaters should always have adult supervision.
- Only visit houses that are known to you and have lights on.
- Use torches, glow sticks or reflective tape to make it easier to be seen in the dark
- Pay attention when crossing driveways to ensure cars are not pulling in or out.
- Be aware of any flames e.g. lit candles in pumpkins, and keep at a safe distance.
- Ensure costumes fit properly to avoid trips and falls.
- Avoid any sharp costume accessories.
- Do not eat sweets or treats until adults give permission.
- Only cross roads at safe places.
- Walk—don't run!
















# FREE SCHOOL MEAL ELIGIBILITY
