This is the second year of our bespoke financial education programme. The children really enjoyed the activities last year and parent feedback suggested that the children really did enhance their financial resilience and their awareness of money.

The OfSTED inspectors who came to visit in the summer term were blown away by the learning that takes place on our Financial Fridays and this aspect of our curriculum was a contributory factor to our outstanding judgement for Personal Development.


£2416 is simply the total of the amounts that have not been paid for since we returned to school in September. This includes


DINOSAURS WERE HUNTED!

Yr 3

Year 3 had an amazing time yesterday at Dinosaur Isle.

The children arrived bright and early, and after a safety briefing from Alex, their guide for the day, headed for the beach. Alex explained to them about different types of fossils and what they should be looking out for.

Within no time at all, the children's pockets were stuffed with their incredible finds! They were looking hard for very dark bits of rock that could actually be dinosaur bones. The children found quite a few of these but they turned out to be fossilised wood. They also found some incredible fossilised sponges.



When the class arrived back at Dinosaur Isle, Alex had prepared some fun activities for us to take part in, where they applied our knowledge of fossils and used a powerful microscope, as well as magnifying glasses to further explore fossils. They also sorted a selection of creatures into dinosaurs and non-dinosaurs and matched some bones to the creatures from which they thought they originated. After that, they had an exploration of Dinosaur Isle. The children acted as palaeontologists, uncovering buried bones and taking part in a range of activities, including being able to smell what dinosaurs were like! They can all confirm that this was not a good smell!

By the end of their day, they were tired but happy and, as we left, Alex told Miss Beale what a lovely class they were, and then also the minibus drivers commented how well behaved they were too. Not only did they learn lots, but they also showed that they can live respectfully, as they make things happen. Well done Coelho Class!

NETTLESTONE MAKES IT HAPPEN AND PERFORMS POETRY!

This academic year we are having a big focus on 'Oracy'. Speaking and Listening has always played an important role in the curriculum, but the team has been putting a lot of thought into how we can improve our children's confidence in speaking confidently and effectively for a range of audiences and purposes. We have created a progression map across the school for Oracy, as well as planning related experiences for children in all year groups. Our progression map for Oracy is extremely specific in detailing skills children should be using in each year group (e.g. an objective from Year 2 is 'Start to use gestures such as pointing, or counting on fingers to support the delivery of ideas.') This means that all members of the teaching team have a clear, shared vision of expectations for ARE so appropriate skills can be modelled and rehearsed in preparation for children independently applying them across the curriculum. We recognize that Oracy is not something that is incidental to children's learning but is a specific skill, needing to be taught and planned for as an outcome in its own right.

A clear bonus of the Oracy focus is that there is a strong link between effective speaking and effective writing.

"If you can't say it, how can you write it?"

The ability to articulate thoughts verbally and to remodel and reshape ideas before writing so that there is a clear, cohesive train of thought, is a vital tool in securing clear structure of written work. Speaking to a range of audiences, as mapped out in the Oracy curriculum, develops awareness of different levels of formality and use of Standard and non-Standard English, which children need to be able to effectively manipulate by the end of Key Stage Two. Additionally, awareness of speaking with expression and emphasis, pausing within sentences and between sentences, means that when children come to write they have a more complete understanding of the function of punctuation —when and how to apply it —as well as other features, such as use of capitals, or writing words in a larger size to indicate to the reader that these need to stand out.

This year, all classes are named after poets and children are regularly performing poetry in class, to their peers, and for a wider audience. This half term, we have piloted whole school Oracy assemblies with pre-recorded, interactive workshops by Michael Rosen and Joseph Coelho, sharing their poems, explaining and demonstrating how to be effective, engaging speakers. Children have then practised together, during the assemblies, the techniques modelled by these poets. This half term's Oracy assemblies culminated this week, with each class performing a poem to the rest of the school in a wonderful assembly to celebrate our skills in Oracy. The children were extremely excited to watch and listen to the performances of their peers and each class showed a superb awareness of engaging their audience. Year One started the morning's celebration and very much impressed the rest of the school by having learned their poem off by heart. The other year groups continued to delight with their enthusiastic performances and the children are all looking forward to sharing their learning with family at home on a recording that will be posted to Seesaw. We very much hope you will enjoy listening to your child's poem just as much as we did in school.







YEAR 5 MAKE IT HAPPEN ON NATIONAL POETRY DAY!

Last week, as part of National Poetry Day, Year 5 took part in a Guinness World Record Attempt to be part of the largest poetry lesson ever. The children had great fun contributing their ideas and seeing how a poet collates ideas and chooses the structure for their poetry. The class are currently waiting to see whether their attempt has been validated, but have received thanks from the poet (Laura Mucha) for their contributions.



WE CAN LIVE RESPECTFULLY - ASSEMBLY THIS WEEK




This week's theme is appreciation. It was also World Mental Health week this week and with World Poverty Day coming up, the teaching team took the opportunity to combine these three themes in class assembly on Monday.



All teachers talked to the children about good mental health being important for overall good health and reminded them of the 'Take a Moment'

campaign that we introduced at school last year. The children remembered having their photo taken while 'taking a moment' (the evidence of which is in the corridor on the way into the hall). Everyone encouraged the children to think about other things they can do to 'take a moment.' Across the school all children came up with talking to somebody, reading, drawing, walking, going out into our environment and some children described writing their feelings down and then screwing the paper up and throwing it away. Everyone also talked about writing your feelings down in a poem and watched Michael Rosen performing his poem 'Angry' which the children found hilarious!



Together they then talked about the impact of poverty on mental health (in a child friendly way) and read the book Invisible by Tom Percival which tells the story of Isabel, whose life is impacted by poverty. She likes being out in nature to 'take a moment' and when her family is forced to move to a place that doesn't have green space, her mental health suffers. The story ends on a happy note, when Isabel finds other like minded souls and they brighten up the town for all to enjoy.

FINANCIAL FRIDAY - TRUST FUNDS

Linked to our Financial Friday we have been asked to remind parents about Child Trust Funds.

The Child Trust Fund was a scheme introduced to encourage saving for children. The scheme was open to all parents of children born between 1st September 2002 and 2nd January 2011.

£ 2.5 Billion

'lost' and 'unclaimed' money in Child Trust Funds

The first set of children who were on the scheme were able to access their money on 1st September 2020.

76% of parents in the UK opened an account when the scheme launched and HMRC estimates there are 700,000 accounts which have been forgotten about or 'lost'. To find out more information please click the link below...

Even if no money was added at all, there could be £250 - £1000 in your account.

FINANCIAL FRIDAY—ADDITIONAL SUPPORT

Could you be claiming up to £2,000 per child each year towards childcare costs?

The Government-backed Tax-Free Childcare scheme is designed so that for every 80p you put into your Tax-Free Childcare account, the state will add 20p. Eligible parents can get up to £2,000 per child per year.



How does it work?

You open an online Tax-Free Childcare account using your Government Gateway ID and for every 80p you pay in, the Government will top up your account. A quick way of making sure you put in the right amount is to look at your childcare bill and multiply it by 0.8. This gives you 80% of the total bill – and the amount you should put in your tax-free childcare account – and you'll get the remaining 20% as a top up (subject to the £2,000 a year cap).

What can you use it for?

You can use tax-free childcare for all sorts of childcare including breakfast clubs, after schools clubs, holiday activities, childminders, nurseries.

Eligibility

To qualify, you (and your partner, if you have one) need to be working (including self employed) and:

Each earn national minimum wage – To be eligible you'll need to earn the equivalent of 16 hours/week at the national minimum wage for your age group.

Each earn £100,000 a year or less.

What do you need to do?

If you're eligible, you'll need to create an online childcare account via the Government Tax-Free Childcare site – www.gov.uk/apply-for-tax-free-childcare.

- Pay money into your online childcare account by making a payment from your bank account using your debit card. The Government will top up the account on the same day.
- Search for the school's name in the list of childcare providers on your childcare account and make a payment directly to the school from your account.
- Once the school receives payment, it will be allocated against your account on School Money and you'll receive an email receipt. Payments can also be held as a credit on your account for future bookings.

SO WHAT HAVE WE BEEN LEARNING THIS WEEK?

This week our little learners have been exploring with their thoughts and ideas together through imaginative play. In the home corner the children have been dressing up, looking after the babies and making lots of exciting recipes from our cook books in our play kitchen. The children then hopped into their cars and camper van they've been making and heading off on a variety of journeys. Our little learners have continued this play in our outside environment and continued to make delicious recipes in our mud kitchen and jumped in the boats for more exciting and imaginative adventures.





In Reception this week we have been listening to the story 'The Little Red Hen'. We have been using our phonemes to write some of the characters. We looked at how wheat grows and how it is turned into flour and then made into bread. In Maths, we have been using the words more and less to identify different amounts and identifying amounts from 1 to 5 looking at the amounts in different patterns. This week we have also been talking about our feelings. We have listened to stories and begun to identify and discuss some emotions; happy, sad and ready to learn. This week we took our first group to visit Ryde library, we all had a great time exploring

the library and listening to a story and we look forward to taking the other groups next week.

What a lovely week we have had in Rosen class! We have started our new book 'The Gruffalo' and we started by asking questions and making predictions about the story. In computing we spoke about rules to keep us safe and happy when using technology. We made some colourful posters and drew pictures to match our rules. In Science we spoke about seasons, more specifically Autumn. We learnt about why the leaves change colour and the change in daylight hours. The class then made some lovely wreaths focusing on the colours of Autumn. In PSHE we spoke about feelings and how our bodies feel differently for each emotion. We discussed the zones of regulation and how it is okay to be in any of the zones.





In Year 2, we have found out that Buddy the Bee has visited South America. We found out about Brazil and made our own posters to show what we learnt. In Maths, we have been comparing numbers using the vocabulary less than, more than and equals. We have been busy drawing a pumpkin and we used it to label it with great descriptive words that we then used to help us write fantastic sentences. We had an amazing time at Ability Dogs 4 Young People where we learnt all about why the dogs were trained to help people and we

took part in helping to train the dogs.

We have had another fun week in Year 3. One of the highlights of the week was performing the poem 'Slime' by Joseph Coelho to the whole school as part of a very special assembly on Tuesday. The poem imagined slime taking over the world and gave us lots of opportunities to put different expression into our voices, as well as to make fun actions. We loved thinking about saying words to reflect the sound the words describe -for example, when the slime went 'plop'. We also wrote a poem of our own at the beginning of the week, which followed on from the Paul Cookson poetry workshop that we enjoyed so much last week. This week, instead of the children being left in class on their own and getting up to mischief, we imagined the teacher being left on her own and getting up to mischief. We just hope that we haven't given Miss Beale too many naughty ideas!



We have had another busy week in Year 4. During our Science lesson we have been using different separation methods to separate mixtures including sand and water, salt and water, paperclips and rice and rice and flour. We have been busy in Maths looking at adding and subtracting 1's, 10's, 100's and 1000's as well as adding 2 4-digit numbers including exchanges. In computing we discussed 'Can we believe everything we read?' The children looked at different images that had been edited and discussed if they were genuine. We discussed why people might share online false information. We thoroughly enjoyed making flower bowls in Art from clay as part of our sculpture work for our plant art topic. In Music we have been busy rehearsing ready for our

performance in front of the school. We finished the week with a webinar with author Hannah Gold about her new book Turtle Moon and by hosting the 'Go Yellow for Mountbatten' to raise money for our class charity Mountbatten hospice.

In Blake Class this week we have been discussing mental strategies for addition and subtraction. We have started to apply our understanding to formal methods of calculation by using a column method of addition for integers of more than four digits. Our English focus has been to edit and evaluate our animal poetry inspired by William Blake. We have also been rehearsing our class performance of 'The Tyger' for our poetry assembly this week. Also, as a result of our participation in National Poetry Day last week, we have received a thank you letter from Laura Mucha (the poet who led our Guinness World Record Attempt for the largest poetry lesson ever).



This week in Year 6 we proofread and edited our poems based on 'Change Sings' by Amanda Gorman. We then read aloud our poems to our classmates. We thoroughly enjoyed listening to the detailed feedback from our friends. Our



our poems to our classmates. We thoroughly enjoyed listening to the detailed feedback from our friends. Our teacher was very impressed with the quality of our feedback too (i.e. "I like the way you merge some of Amanda Gorman's ideas with your own."). As a class we are taking part in the Fields of Remembrance project being run by English Heritage. We are researching and creating posters about some of the many names that appear on the World War II memorial at Carisbrooke Castle. We are finding out about the people behind the names. Our posters will be on display at the castle in November. We are looking forward to seeing them in place.

Talk to me about... reading aloud to engage the audience.

Words to use... emphasis, expression, loud, soft, pause, actions.

Tips for the week... We have been exploring how we can use our voices to engage an audience and how to read a poem aloud so that our voices convey the meaning of the words.

We have been reading...Poems by Joseph Coelho.

YEAR R

Talk to me about... wheat and bread.

Words to use... h for helicopter, b for bear, f for flamingo, I for lollipop.

Tips for the week... to practise our rhymes, including our new rhyme Down at the station.

We have been reading... The Little Red Hen by Mary Mapes Dodge.

YEAR 2

Talk to me about...comparing numbers.

Words to use... equals, more than, less than.

Tips for the week..... Portuguese is the language spoken in Brazil. The capital city is Brasilia but the most famous city is Rio de Janeiro.

We have been reading...The Enormous Turnip by Irene Yates and Charlie and the Chocolate Factory by Roald Dahl.

YEAR 4

Talk to me about... separating mixtures, flower bowls, adding 2 4-digit numbers and is everything you read online true?

Words to use... online, true, exchanging, addition, clay, sculpture, separating, substances, mixtures, sieving, magnetism, floating, filtration and evaporation.

Tips for the week... continue to learn your times tables and common exception words.

We have been reading... The lost whale by Hannah Gold.

YEAR 5

Talk to me about...what a relative clause is and how to identify one in a sentence.

Words to use...relative pronoun (who, which, that, whose, where and when), noun, extra information about the noun.

Tips for the week...remember when adding integers using a column method with more than four digits to align your place value correctly.

We have been reading...Lightning Mary by Angela Simmons.

YEAR 6

Talk to me about... how I can stay safe online when I am spending money.

Words to use...bank account, financial, finances, scam, remembrance, memorial.

Tips for the week...remember how important your times tables are. Have you practised them recently? If not, why not play times table bingo (just like we do in class)?

We have been reading... Letters from the Lighthouse by Emma Carroll. How will Olive and Cliff cope with the 20 feet climb to the front door of the lighthouse?
















FREE SCHOOL MEAL ELIGIBILITY
