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

We started our term with the focus on our value of Friendship. Mrs Jacobs read the text 'Troll Stinks'. 

MAKING HEALTHY CHOICES-PHARMACY FIRST

We have been contacted by the Director of Public Health this week to ask that we promote a new service - Pharmacy First. This service enables patients to be referred to, or walk into, a community pharmacy for a minor illness or an urgent medicine supply.

There are five conditions that commonly affect children that are included in the service; ear ache, sore throat, infected insect bites, impetigo and sinusitis.

By going straight to the local pharmacy you can have a consultation with a trained pharmacist and receive advice and medication (if appropriate).

This may help children get on the road to recovery sooner and prevent them missing school.

We have also been asked to promote the Healthier Together app which is a great source of information



for parents and carers across Hampshire and the Isle of Wight. The app, which can be easily downloaded, provides parents and carers with information to help keep their child safe and healthy, as well as helping them decide what to do when their child is unwell.



SO WHAT HAVE WE BEEN LEARNING THIS WEEK?

Our little learners have enthusiastically returned to preschool after the half term break. We have seen them engaging in their own interest together with friends and keen to join in with activities within the setting. This week we learnt about Bonfire Night and looked at how fireworks are used at different celebrations. The children made firework pictures and learnt about keeping safe around fireworks and fire. We discussed how fireworks made us and our pets feel. We also talked about the difference in night & day, dark & light.

This week in Reception we have been learning about Diwali, the festival of light. We have learnt about how people celebrate Diwali around the world. To learn about some of the traditions, we made clay divas and we enjoyed decorating these. We also looked at Rangoli patterns and the different colours. We have also learnt about bonfire and firework night, listening to a story and creating firework prints, and 2d shape rocket pictures. This week we have learnt about number 6 and as well as understanding numbers up to 5, counting actions and identifying different number patterns up to 5. In Drawing club, we have listened to the story 'Room on a broom' and we have

drawn characters and the setting of the story applying our phonics to support. We have been recapping some of our phonemes and practising our blending in phonics. Our rhyme this week was Jack and Jill. We had lots of fun listening to sounds and identifying rhyming words.

What a fantastic and busy first week we have had in Rosen Class! In English we started the week by discussing the concept of being 'lost' and related this to our own experiences. We then made predictions about our new book 'Beegu.' We revealed a picture bit by bit and the class had some amazing prediction ideas. We then read the book and expressed our opinions about what we like or dislike. In Maths we have been building on our knowledge of our number bonds to 10. We have been learning all about addition and using the 'count all' and 'count on' strategies. We have started History this term and this week we spoke all about toys! We spoke about what toys are like today and the class loved sharing what their favourite toy is!

A super start to the new half term in Year 2. We have started our new text 'The Queen's Hat' by Steve Antony. First, we made predictions of what we think the story was about and what might have happened to the Queen's hat. We then looked at a picture of a circus and thought of some fantastic adjectives to describe and used these in a sentence. After this, we found different verbs for walking and used these to write about the clown. We introduced 'and' to connect two statements and thought of other onomatopoeic words to describe how the balloon was carried away by the wind. We used different punctuation such as exclamation marks to show impact. In Maths, we have been ordering numbers up to 100, counting in 2's, 5's, 10's and 3's. We have

started on addition and subtraction by learning about fact families. Our Science lessons were messy as we had to investigate how to make a really slippery slide by testing which liquid would be the best to use. In History, we have been using portraits to find out about Queen Victoria. In PSHE, we have been finding out what makes us who we are.

We have had a positive start to the new term. We have particularly enjoyed starting our new text for our writing learning journey, 'Interview with a Tiger and Other Clawed Bests Too'. It has been fun learning about El Dia de los Muertos and we drew some amazing sugar skulls, which also helped with our listening skills. We are continuing to use different strategies for addition in Maths and some of us have started noticing some interesting patterns in our answers.



A good first week back for Year 4. We looked at a variety of Remembrance Day poems in English this week and used 'The Fallen and In Flanders Fields' to create some amazing black out poetry - look on Facebook to see them. Maths this week we have been looking at subtraction and exchanging across columns. We also looked at efficient methods to solve addition and subtraction calculations. In PSHE this week we discussed negotiating and compromising and why it is important to compromise sometimes. The children looked at different scenarios and how they would negotiate and compromise to solve the scenario. We started our new topic in Geography this half term looking at the question are all deserts Hot, Hot, Hot?

Our focus in Maths this week has been to apply our understanding of addition and subtraction to multi-step word problems. We have been working hard to ensure we are reading the question carefully in order to choose the most appropriate method. In our English lessons this week, we have been introducing ourselves to our new text for this term ('The Island'). We have been exploring themes, characters and settings within the text and created our own diary entries in response. Following on from our visit to Havenstreet Railway last term, we started to explore the historical context of 'The Beeching Axe' and its impact on the railways.



This week in Year 6 we started a new writing journey based on Letters from the Lighthouse by Emma Carroll. The novel is set during World War II and we see the world of the evacuee through the eyes of Olive, a young girl evacuated to the coast of Devon with her younger brother Cliff. We have made some thoughtful predictions about the novel during some interesting class discussions. We also created some very persuasive blurbs. In Maths we have focused on the rules of divisibility, prime numbers up to 100, square numbers and cubed numbers. During our reading lessons we discovered the details of the story of Bonfire Night. We were fascinated by the plot that Robert Catesby, Guy Fawkes and 11 other conspirators came up with. We were shocked by the punishment they suffered.









CONVERSATION STARTERS!

Want to know what your children have been learning this week? Here are some conversation starters that may help you talk to them about what they have been up to in class!

PRE-SCHOOL

Talk to me about...Fireworks. Words to use....safety, dark, light, sparkle, bright, noise. Tips for the week...please make sure all your child's belongings are named.

We have been reading...Big Red Bath by Julia Jarman.

<u>YEAR 1</u>

Talk to me about... Beegu!

Words to use...lost, spaceship, crash, Earth, space, children, parents.

Tips for the week...can you use adjectives to describe your favourite toy?

We have been reading...Beegu by Alexis Deacon.

<u>YEAR 3</u>

Talk to me about... the new words I have learnt this week. Words to use ...desiccated, extreme, elusive, rarely, principally. Tips for the week... words with similar meanings are called synonyms.

We have been reading... Interview with a Tiger and Other Clawed Beasts Too by Andy Sees and Nick East.

<u>YEAR 5</u>

Talk to me about...how to solve multi-step word problems in maths. Words to use...addition, subtraction, using the inverse operation.

Tips for the week...ensure you have read the question carefully to make sure you choose the most appropriate method.

We have been reading...'Lightning Mary' by Angela Simmons and 'The Island' by Armin Greder.

<u>YEAR R</u>

Talk to me about... Diwali, Remembrance Day.

Words to use... celebrations, lights, Rangoli, divas.

Tips for the week... to remember how to be safe at bonfires and fireworks or if holding a sparkler.

We have been reading... Room on a broom by Julia Donaldson.

<u>YEAR 2</u>

Talk to me about...adjectives to describe a circus.

Words to use... beautiful, stunning, grand, majestic, elaborate, magnificent, ornate, spectacular, striking, amazing, marvellous, splendid, lavish, glorious.

Tips for the week... an onomatopoeic word is a word that resembles or suggests the sound that is describes. These could be animal noises such as oink, meow, roar and chirp.

We have been reading...The Queen's Hat by Steve Antony and Charlie and the Chocolate Factory by Roald Dahl.

<u>YEAR 4</u>

Talk to me about... famous deserts, types of deserts, exchanging across columns with subtraction, black out poetry and negotiating and compromising.

Words to use... negotiating, compromising, desert, hot and dry deserts, semi-arid deserts, coastal deserts cold deserts and black out poetry.

Tips for the week... continue learning your times tables and common exception words.

We have been reading... The Lost Whale by Hannah Gold.

<u>YEAR 6</u>

Talk to me about... Letters from the Lighthouse by Emma Carroll. What do you think will happen at the end of the novel?

Words to use... evacuee, Luftwaffe, prediction, prime number, square number, cubed number, data packets.

Tips for the week... use any spare time to practise the multiplication tables you find tricky. Recite them to Mrs Newton for a sticker and a marble for the class jar.

We have been reading... Letters from the Lighthouse by Emma Carroll. What will happen to the lighthouse? How will the village 'erase' it and what will happen to Ephraim?


School kitchens transformed their counters, and students enjoyed their favourite fish and chips with a Lemon drizzle cake for dessert.
