YOU CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE—REVIEW OF COSTS FOR CLUBS AND WRAP-AROUND CARE

Due to ongoing financial challenges within the Federation, inadequate government funding, and continually increasing running costs, the Governors have requested a review of the cost of providing clubs and wrap-around care. Our aim is to continue to provide the best possible offer with the resources we have and, as much as we can, not to reduce any existing offer.

Our review will determine the cost to the school of providing the care, including wages, sustenance, and other related expenses, to assess if a price rise is necessary. Given that we haven't increased the costs of

clubs for a very long time and as our general running costs have increased, we are anticipating some level of increase but please be assured that any increase will only take effect from the start of the Summer term.

We invite parents to share any questions, concerns, or suggestions regarding this review. Your feedback is valuable to us as we strive to provide the best possible care for your children and to support this we will be sharing an electronic survey with you along with this newsletter. Please share your views to make a difference. Please be mindful that our care offer is determined by the availability of our staff team and is not part of their contracted times. 


WE CAN LIVE RESPECTFULLY— ASSEMBLY THIS WEEK

KEEPING CHILDREN SAFE— USE OF AI

It was internet safety day on Tuesday this week. AI-generated content and tools like chatbots, content generators, and summaries are becoming increasingly common in popular online apps and services. These AI tools offer many benefits, such as helping users find information, create content, and receive support quickly through



chat functions. However, there are also risks associated with their use, especially for children.

The content children encounter might not always be age-appropriate, legal, or promote healthy behaviours and choices. There is a risk of harm through the misuse of AI content generators, which can create realistic-looking content intended to cause harm, such as bullying and sexual abuse.

We have been alerted to a new webpage created by the NSPCC to help better guide parents to the world of AI and help them to learn more about artificial intelligence content and tools and discover simple ways to help your children stay safe. The aim of these assemblies is to help children to further develop their skills of oracy, performing to a large audience and using their voices and gestures to convey the meaning of what they are saying in a lively, engaging manner. WE CAN MAKE HEALTHY CHOICES

To kick start Safer Internet Day, Years 3-6 have just taken part in an interactive, online lesson with Tech She Can focusing on Cyber Security.

Firstly, we discussed what personal information is; how to protect it and what online privacy is.

The children were also made aware of careers within Cyber Security

(e.g. Ethical hacking, a Cyber Threat Analyst and an Incident responder – acting when a hacker accesses a system) and Online Privacy (e.g. a software developer or a Cryptographer – keeping valuable information safe from hackers).

We discussed what a scam is and the different types of scams (e.g. phishing emails, pop up messages, creation of apps and fake online deals). We pretended to be Cyber Threat Analysts and completed an activity whereby we were given different scenarios and had to decide whether they were 'safe' or 'sus'.

The children were introduced to encryption and firewalls and the importance of this for online privacy.

Finally, we discussed device security and the importance of keeping devices secure. The children had the definition of malware (e.g. computer viruses) explained to them and the importance of not having a 'weak' password. We learnt the three random words are the most effective to combine for a safer password. The children were informed of the importance of software updates and biometrics (e.g. Face ID) for device security. We learnt that biometrics are features unique to you to prove identity and "It's like having a key, but the key is you."

We ended the session with reminders of where to go to find advice and guidance about keeping safe online.

Year 6 were very well informed regarding internet safety but they found the

The webinar explained clearly the risks the Internet poses but it also shared ways to stay safe when we access the Internet. We were particularly interested in the idea of three random words for passwords and the idea that there are ethical hackers working to help companies with their internet

security.

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
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Years 5 and 6 enjoyed the Trustworthy Trout activity. They loved playing detective as they read texts, emails and messages to decide whether they were trustworthy or not.



Today is internet safety day and in Reception we talked about what to do if something pops up on the screen when playing on a device. Everyone knew you most stop and tell and adult. We listened to a story and talked about how the girl felt during the story using emotion cards.

SO WHAT HAVE WE BEEN LEARNING THIS WEEK?

This week in preschool our little learners have been showing love and kindness. We were dynamic designers and made our own love hearts. We explored mixing paints to make pinks and purples to paint our hearts then using our fine motor skills and hand eye coordination we threaded our hearts with string. We talked together about feelings, using our zones of regulation to help support our learning. We thought about words support our understanding of love and kindness such as gentle, nice, soft & helpful and we used opposites to support our understanding of words.






This week Reception have really enjoyed participating in Nettlestone's storytelling week. We have read lots of books and watched some recorded webinars from authors and illustrators and watched how to draw videos by authors. We have enjoyed taking part in our reading challenges, especially when we had extra time to read with our Year 6 buddies this week. We have made bookmarks, as well as sharing our favourite stories and making books. We have continued learning about Space and listening to an information book about galaxies, stars and planets. Reception participated in our school poetry performance assembly on Wednesday and performed a

poem to the school. On Tuesday we took part in our safer internet day. We talked about what to do if something appears on a device when playing. We discussed that we should stop and tell. Today we have had lots of fun taking part in our pyjamarama day and enjoying the book swap shop.

It has been a lovely end to the term here in Year 1. This week in Phonics we spent time reviewing all of the phonemes and tricky words we have learnt this term. In English we explored different instructions and used drama to act them out. The class then used this to write a simple instruction of how to grow a carrot. On Wednesday the class performed their performance poetry 'We Can' in assembly. They did very well at remembering the actions and adding expression to their performance. In Maths we have been using our numbers bonds to 10 to recognise patterns for number bonds to 20. In Science we discussed all of our learning from this term. We observed our cress and sunflower plants to compare the changes they have made over the weeks. In Computing our learning has enabled the class to program a Bee-Bot and find alternative routes. In Geography we looked at the weather in polar regions and linked this to Art and made some cool northern lights pictures! I hope everyone has a restful break.



We have had a fabulous week this week. We were particularly proud of ourselves for learning the poem 'Bed in Summer' by Robert Louis Stevenson off by heart. We loved thinking about the expression we would use in reading this poem and also the gestures we could add. We performed this poem to the whole school during our poetry assembly and received a loud round of applause! In class, we have had a fun time carrying out this week's reading challenges, which have included reading under the table and reading in a different classroom. (We went down to Pre School and had a brilliant time reading with the younger children. We hope we can go back to visit them soon!) We also enjoyed listening to a story from when we were younger 'Stick Man'- and using the rhyming pattern to predict which words would come next.





A lovely end to the term this week in Year 4. We have loved celebrating Nettlestone's Story Telling festival this week where we have had visits from local authors Christopher Stevens and Neal Layton as well as a webinar with author Tola Okogwu and the author of our current class novel Jenny Mclachlan who has a new book in the Land of Roar series. We have also enjoyed taking part in the reading challenges this week and finishing today with Pyjamarama day and the new to you book swap. In Maths this week we have continued to look at perimeter where we have calculated the perimeter of rectilinear shapes as well as finding the missing lengths in rectilinear

shapes to allow us to calculate the perimeter and also calculating the area of polygons.

This week Year 5 have focused on multiplication methods (reminding ourselves how to use the array method followed by the grid). We have also been completing daily activities to celebrate storytelling week and performed the poem 'What do you think counts?' as part of our poetry showcase assembly. In addition, we also took part in an online lesson for Safer Internet Day. We spent time discussing what a scam is, how to identify one and how we can protect ourselves online. We looked at a variety of messages and scenarios to decide which were 'safe' and which were 'sus'. Well done Year 5 for engaging so well this week. Enjoy your half term holiday!





This week in Year 6 we took part in an excellent Safer Internet Day webinar. We discovered that a password using three random words is very secure. We also discovered that there are a number of careers in internet security: biometric engineers, cyber threat analysts and even ethical hackers! We enjoyed the activities too. We played detective as we read a variety of texts, emails and messages and then decided whether they were trustworthy or not. We gave Sherlock Holmes a run for his money! We have continued our work with fractions: multiplying fractions by integers and dividing fractions.

Please can we remind all families that **children in Reception**, **Year 1** and **Year 2** are eligible for a yummy free meal every single day. For children in Key Stage 2 and any parent that has a change in personal circumstances the eligibility criteria for free school meals can be found at apply for free school meals.

If the application is approved eligibility can open a gateway to a host of additional benefits for your child including supporting the purchase of school uniform, funding for school trips and additional in-class support. It really is worth applying.
