This week Ofsted released their official report following the inspection of Nettlestone Primary School. We have all been eagerly awaiting the result and we are so pleased and proud that the **overall effectiveness grading is GOOD**. This is a tremendous outcome for all the staff who have invested their time, energy, efforts and have worked so hard to ensure the Ofsted Inspectors understood our school family, wider community and the absolutely amazing offer we are able to provide to our children. Your support, as parents, was greatly appreciated during the inspection with so many good things being said about the school by you.

The inspection concentrated on 5 keys areas and graded them as

During the feedback shared with the leadership team and Governing Body, the lead inspector made comments about how excellent the school was and how, to receive an 'outstanding' grading for Personal Development is testament to the hard work of our staff to enrich the lives of our children. The Inspector also commented on how close the team were to achieving an outstanding grade for Leadership. Again, testament to all the hard work of our Executive Headteacher, Head of School, Senior Staff and Subject Leads. Well done to all of them!

The Inspector also praised the clarity of our vision, encapsulated by our Mission Possibles. They recognised that these are the golden threads that run throughout every aspect of work across the Federation.

Whilst the inspectors identified our many strengths, they also highlighted two areas for improvement. These did not come as a surprise to senior staff or Governors as we were aware of these issues already and plans are already in place to address them during the next school year.

We could say more but suffice to say that we, as Governors, are extremely proud of the school and all of its staff who without doubt, showed resilience and "made it happen". Thank you to the whole team who all contributed in their special way.

END OF KEY STAGE OUTCOMES

On Tuesday, staff were advised of the outcomes of the unvalidated Key Stage 2 SATS taken by Year 6.

Considering the pupils who took these tests were only part-way through Year 2 when schools first closed due to the pandemic and suffered continued disruption when schools were closed again whilst they were in Year 3 we were pleased with how well the Year 6 children have done given their unique starting points and Key Stage 2 journey.

To demonstrate the resilience and commitment to showcase all that they could do within the test conditions was a big ask of the children given that the pandemic inevitably impacted the emotional and mental wellbeing of many of the pupils too and with this in mind we simply could not be more proud of their outcomes.

Whilst staff were determined to work hard and prioritise the skills of reading, writing and maths this has not been at the detriment of the rest of the curriculum and our Year 6 children have applied themselves really well whilst simultaneously benefitting from a whole host of enrichment and experiences in subjects such as Music, PE, History and Art. Their talents have shone well beyond these percentage outcomes all year!

Individual results will be shared as part of the end of year report but here are the main headlines of the performance of Nettlestone pupils achieving age related expectations compared to the national figures for 2024.



What these results do not capture is just how close some of our pupils were in meeting their age related expectations—on a different day they may just have achieved a different score—particularly in the maths tests. Whilst this is a little bit frustrating we are super confident that all of our children have received a very high standard of primary education across the curriculum throughout their time at Nettlestone.

As you are already aware there will be a Federation focus on oracy and spelling in particular next year which we hope will address the dip in our spelling, grammar and punctuation scores this year, an area in which we have historically done very well in. We are looking forward to sharing our progress with you.

PRE-SCHOOL AND RECEPTION MAKE A DIFFERENCE!

The children in Year 5 have been very inspired by our text driver for this half term's poetry writing, the poetry anthology, 'The Lost Words'. They have had much fun exploring the poems and thinking carefully about how to read them aloud with appropriate expression. They have also done some excellent detective work, identifying patterns within the poems. They have noticed how precise word choices are

used for effect and have experimented with this themselves, creating powerful metaphors to use in their own poems. As well as including some wonderful poems, this anthology is beautifully illustrated and we have spent time reflecting on the pictures too. On Wednesday afternoon, the children created these beautiful pictures, based on images from 'The Lost Words'. The class concentrated brilliantly, thinking carefully about their use of colour and shading, and really enjoyed creating their art work.

KEEPING CHILDREN SAFE __ SUMMERTIME SCREEN TIME

Although the weather does not appear to have got the memo it is summer and the school holidays are nearly here! While we can't guarantee sun time, we can predict high levels of screen time for our children and young people during the school holiday season.



It might seem that the easiest option for managing screen time is to not allow it at all, but screen time activities like gaming and social media are a source of fun for children and young people. It is often how they communicate with their friends while they're not seeing them every day at school, so banning all screen time would most likely be counterproductive or even harmful, as it can cut off children and young people from their outside world. A more productive approach would be to establish boundaries and develop healthy habits, which will balance their screen time while also ensuring their needs are recognised.

Be curious not confrontational

In the regular conversations you have with the children and young people in your care, ask them questions out of interest like, "That game looks fun, what do you like about it?". This creation of a casual and open space will make them more likely to share more with you about what they're doing online.

Make a plan

Agree together what good screen time habits are and set clear boundaries on how much time to spend on devices every day. Every child or young person will have different needs when it comes to screen time, so keep this in mind when making your plan.

Use parental controls to manage access

Many platforms offer parental controls that limit screen time and access to age-appropriate content. Be sure you are aware what these are and where to find them!

Arrange off screen activities

Having fun and entertaining ways for children and young people to spend their time when they're away from their devices will encourage them to stick to their plan. Board games, gardening, crafting and reading are some ideas to have fun while learning some useful skills.

Lead by example

Adults spend nearly as much time on their screens as children and young people, with the average adult in the UK spending over 6 hours a day on digital devices. Always remember, your children are looking to you as an example, so seek to manage your own screen time as well as theirs!

We will secure the future of our world class universities as engines of growth, ambition and opportunity for all.

There is a sense of nervous anticipation as we know that education currently is severely underfunded and we really hope that the promises result in a transformation of the system that bring the best possible opportunities and outcomes for all of our children. We will watch this space...



SO WHAT HAVE WE BEEN LEARNING THIS WEEK?

Our rhyme this week gave us lots of opportunities to talk about the weather. The children have been enjoying singing 'The sun has got his hat on'. However they also decided we needed to sing 'Rain rain go away, come again another day'. We had a visit from our chosen charity Aspire, and have been showing we can live respectfully and we make a difference. We donated food bank items and had our preloved toy sale to raise money. This has continued to support our little learners to understand the importance of the wider community and how we can help and take care of the environment around us.

This week, Reception Class have explored sea creatures! We've watched some videos, listened to the sounds they make, and had a go at making some in our craft area. We have also had a visit from a volunteer of Sandown Lifeboat, who taught the children how to stay safe at the beach, who to phone if help is needed, and how to float safely in the water. We then got to try on some of the lifeboat equipment! Early Years has also been very busy this week preparing for our charity "Aspire". We have been collecting preloved toys to sell for donations. The money will go to Aspire. On Tuesday, the children had their transition day in Year One where they met their new teacher and took part in activities to get to know her.

Year 1 have had another fabulous week this week. They have been continuing their learning about pirates and have been learning about Dickie Dawes and enquiring into whether they thought he was a pirate. They also had four artefacts to investigate to help them learn about the life of a smuggler. The children continued their English based on the book 'The Night Pirates' by Peter Harris. They have created their own main characters and have started planning their own stories. In Maths the children have continued learning about time and have been looking at o'clock and half past. In computing the children have been continuing to develop their word-processing skills and have been learning about how to highlight text and change the font. In DT the children have been tasting different fruits before they design their own fruit kebabs.

> This week, Year 2 have been learning about pictograms and understanding how to create a pictogram and collect the data. We have had lots of fun finding out our friend's favourite fruit or pets and recording the information in a pictogram. In English, Year 2 have been learning about apostrophes and how to use them in our writing. We also wrote a postcard to the alien from the boy, linked to our text 'The Way Back Home'. In computing, we have used all the elements of Chrome Music lab to create a piece of music that describes an animal. In PE we have been practising races and skills in preparation for Sports Day.

This week in Year 3, we have been looking at the titles of some of the books on a bookshelf at Eatem Hall. We have then made up our own titles using word play. Then, we read a letter from Dr. Hunter with lots of spelling errors and punctuation which we had to edit. Next, we have planned instructions of how to operate the bandstand contraption. In Maths we have continued to learn how to measure in kilograms and grams. In P.S.H.E we have been discussing what personal information is and who can have access to it.

Yr 4

We have had another busy week in Year 4 this week. We started the week by presenting our History presentations on Ancient Greek archaeological sites. We then moved onto looking at Alexander the Great and why he is remembered. In Maths this week we continued looking at shapes and focused on quadrilaterals and polygons, looking at both regular and irregular shapes. During PSHE we looked at puberty and how our feelings change and sometimes we can have arguments with our parents due to wanting to do things that our parents might disagree with. We also looked at puberty and how our body changes. In English we started our new book Tuesday. We looked in detail looking at the text and discussing what we predicted might happen, some freeze

frames and drama and also some work on speech. We had great fun in DT this week making different nets and thinking about how we can strengthen the material to make them suitable for protecting and containing an Ancient Greek artefact.

This week we had our final session of sailing. We were able to sail the Picos from the boat park and had a fair amount of wind, which meant we could enjoy some friendly races, making good use of all of the skills we have been learning over the last ten weeks. We have also created some beautiful art work relating to The Lost Words -the poetry anthology forming the basis of our writing learning journey this half term. We made extremely careful pencil sketches and put a lot of thought into our use of colour. In Maths, we have been extending our learning on decimals and have successfully added and subtracted decimals with different numbers of digits. A big excitement for the week was finally reaching the conclusion of the second Jake Atlas adventure that we have shared as a class. Finally, we have enjoyed using our Spanish to play games, as well as holding extended conversations.



This week in Yen class we spent a day at our new secondary schools. We had the opportunity to visit the science laboratories where we carried out investigations involving friction and Bunsen Burners. We found out that different metals change colour when they are heated. We also had the opportunity to play hockey and rounders on the sports pitches at the high schools. It was really interesting to find out about the reward systems (raffle tickets at Ryde Academy) and to catch up with friends who attend the schools we will be going to in September. Some of us took part in the Bikeability programme. We learned how to ride our bikes safely on the road. We finished this busy week with a visit to the Isle of Wight College. We met people from a number of different industries: childcare, sport and computing. It was a really interesting day.


