her what this means and they were also able to make the connection with the British Values of respect and individual liberty.



snowflakes and meets one new friend before being amazed to finally find out how big a million really is. The children were astounded to


find out that it would take 12 days to count to one million.

Please can we politely remind parents that full school uniform should be worn on each day with only the exception of PE Days.




If your child is participating in an after-school club, arrangements are in place to facilitate changing.

YEAR 1 LEARN HOW TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE

In Year 1 this week the children were lucky enough to be visited by the 'Wight for Sight' charity. The children got the opportunity to find out what it would be like to live with a visual impairment. They explored books make with braille and then learnt how to write words and their names using braille. The children also used their other senses to explore objects and play games. They had to use their hearing to hear sounds and use their touch to turn a door key and play games and it was a fascinating session for all.









EARLY YEARS MAKE IT HAPPEN!

Yesterday after school, the EYFS Team showcased their environment and ethos to other Early Years practitioners from across the Isle of Wight. Lots of teachers came from other schools to learn about what we do in Pre School and Year R. They enjoyed looking at our EYFS provision, admired our lovely grounds and also took away a few ideas that they can use in their own settings. We received some really lovely feedback commenting on the calm and purposeful setting that we have here at Nettlestone and how the visitors were very jealous of the environments on offer! Well done to our Early Years Team who 'make it happen' every day!











WE CAN MAKE HEALTHY CHOICES—MOBILE PHONES

We regularly talk to children about safety matters and lately we have been very surprised to hear that children in Year 2 already have access to smart phone technology with the mobile phone usually being requested as the prize birthday gift.

The question of when to give your child their first phone is one that many parents struggle with.

As a parent, you want to ensure that your child is ready for the responsibilities and potential risks that come with owning a phone. And the children? Well, they want to feel included socially, to enjoy the freedoms that a device may give them, and to feel trusted.

The decision isn't easy. So we thought it helpful to share the answers to 8 simple question that were asked to experts in technology, psychology and social media, which may help parents consider carefully the healthy choice about whether to give their child their own mobile phone? We hope that it helps you to make a healthy choice.

Question #1: Why?

Why do they need a phone? Is it for safety and communication purposes? Are you, the parent, driving the desire for a phone? Or is your child? Perhaps it's their friends? Understanding the underlying motivation will help you determine if your child is truly ready for a phone.

Question #4: Do I, as a parent, have the ability to monitor and guide my child's

phone usage?

Monitoring your child's phone activity is an essential aspect of responsible parenting. Are you willing and able to keep an eye on their online interactions, app usage, and browsing history? Do you need to consider parental control tools that can assist you in this task?

Question #2: Is my child responsible in other areas?

Maturity plays a crucial role in responsible phone ownership. Reflect on your child's ability to follow rules, make good decisions, and manage their time effectively. Can they handle the distractions and temptations that come with having access to the internet and social media?

Question #5: Have we discussed responsible phone use?

Stepping from the 'real world' into virtual space is like traveling to a different country. There are different forms of etiquette, the language used is different, and there may be different kinds of dangers. Before getting your child a phone, have an open conversation about what it means to be responsible in that space. Discuss appropriate content, online behaviour, and the importance of privacy.

Question #3: Can my child unplug from their current tech access?

I CAN MAKE HEALTHY CHOICES

Are they in control of their current screen use? If they already struggle with excessive screen time, it might be a sign that they need more guidance and self -control before being entrusted with a phone.


Question #6: Have we set clear boundaries and rules together?

Instead of simply telling them what the rules will be, get them invested by collaborating with them. Determine what times they should not use their phone, such as during meals or before bedtime. Agree on which apps are allowed and which ones are off-limits

Question #7 Does my child have the maturity for a mobile phone?

Having a phone means being exposed to social media, messaging apps, and online interactions.

Consider whether your child is emotionally prepared to handle potential cyberbullying, peer pressure, or inappropriate content. Can your child show kindness and respect to others?



Question #8

Are there other options that will meet my child's needs?

Does it have to be an all singing and dancing smartphone? For example, a basic phone with limited features, may be sufficient while reducing distractions and risks associated with full-on internet access.




YEAR 4 'MAKE IT HAPPEN' DURING THEIR ROMAN DAY

KEEPING CHILDREN SAFE—OUR BEHAVIOUR POLICY



Our Parent Forum have met today and on the agenda was a review of our Positive Behaviour Policy.

At Nettlestone Primary School we have high expectations for pupil's behaviour and conduct. To ensure that these expectations are commonly understood and applied consistently and fairly we have a Positive Behaviour Policy.



Mrs Kelly has recently been working with groups of pupils from across the Federation to ensure that the content of the policy remains reflective of what the children believe to be fair and today the Parent Forum were also able to contribute their views.

The policy takes into account all newly updated guidance from the DfE as well as capturing the school's approaches to behaviour that have worked well over time to secure highly positive attitudes to learning.

We remain incredibly proud of the very large majority of our community who always behave consistently well and also of the progress that individual children make when faced with behaviour struggles.

We have had visitors to the school over recent weeks and they noted the calm and purposeful atmosphere in school and how happy the children appeared to be in their learning. Children were able to talk about how they make a positive contribution to school life and it was lovely to share scheme such as our Year 6 Buddy system which enables our older pupils to make a real and purposeful difference to the well-being of our youngest learners.



Miss Howarth also undertakes regular safety surveys with the children and recently it was Year 3's turn to speak out to stay safe. They told Miss Howarth, and one of our governors Mrs Wrixon, that they had complete trust that staff in school would help them to sort out any issues that may arise and they could name things that they felt were 'healthy' and 'unhealthy'. All of the children shared that missing a day at school made them feel sad as they don't get to see their friends and that when they come back

to school they don't know what their class is learning. Miss Howarth shared that it was a pleasure to talk with them and gave them all a special 'I can make a difference' sticker in celebration of them confidently sharing their opinions.

SO WHAT HAVE WE BEEN LEARNING THIS WEEK?

Our little learners have been showing 'I can live respectfully' and 'I can make a difference'. We have been following on and extended our learning. In February we set up our own pre school shop and sold biscuits that we made, the children have used the money to visit the local shop and buy items to deliver to the food bank. We have also been looking closely at and understanding the life cycle of plants. We have grown cress and decorated our own flower pots ready to plants seeds to watch them grow.



Yr 3



Reception class have been finishing their focus on Goldilocks and the Three Bears, ready to start a new fairy-tale focus next week. They have been busy writers this week creating recipe books for porridge, using their phonic knowledge and tricky words! In Maths, we have continued learning about symmetry, doubles, and looking at the composition of the number 8. The children have worked hard to recognise the number bonds for 8. We have also been talking about capital letters this week, matching and recognising the capital letter to their lowercase form.

Year 1 have had another busy week this week. On Wednesday the children had the opportunity to have a visit from the charity 'Sight for Wight' and the children undertook a workshop. They learnt about what life is like for those people who have a vision impairment. The children learnt about braille and used their senses to explore sounds and objects. They were blindfolded and had to attempt tasks and complete a puzzle. They also explored different tools and gadgets that people with a visual impairment can use to support themselves. In English, the children continued their learning based on the book 'Tidy' by Emily Gravett. They have been hot seated as different animals in the forest and had to ask them questions. As well as writing questions the children have also explored rhyming words within the book. In Maths, this week the children have completed their unit on Counting numbers to 50 and have started learning about measuring height and length. In Computing, as part of their unit on digital painting the children have continued to use shapes and lines to create pictures. In DT, the classroom has been covered with cardboard and plastic as the children start making their greenhouses.



This week Year 2 have been learning more about the Great Fire of London. We had a fantastic day on Thursday, where we took part in a virtual workshop. We have been sharing our learning from this day at our showcase assembly today. In English this week, we have been using the resources from BBC Bitesize to support us with learning more about the Great Fire of London. We have been learning about recounts and using drama to support our English. In Maths we have been continuing to learn about measure and comparing cm to m. In Science we started our new theme on plants, recapping our previous learning and identifying what plants need to grow. In computing we discussed why some

photos are taken in portrait mode and some are in landscape and we have tried to find out ourselves what works best. In PSHE we talked about places that make us feel safe and how our body tells us if we think something is unsafe. We discussed things that make us happy.

This week we have been planning and telling each other our own stories of an Egyptian Cinderella. In Science we have been investigating how to make the best water slide possible. We have been finding out how the amount of detergent added to water affects how slippery it is. We have been Egyptologists and found out how a picture tells us about life in Ancient Egyptian times. In our Maths lessons we have been dividing two digits by one digit with remainders.



We have had a busy week in Year 4 this week. In English we carried out a debate on whether Grandpa Joe should be allowed to go to the chocolate factory and used persuasive language to persuade Miss Crumplin to either take Grandpa Joe or not. In Maths we have started looking at fractions and have been looking at mixed numbers. In Science we carried out our investigation on what happens to the brightness of the bulbs when more bulbs are added to the circuit. We enjoyed starting to record our podcast in Computing lessons this week and had great fun making different types of switches in DT. On Thursday we had our Roman day and some amazing costumes were worn. We enjoyed making our own mosaic biscuits, trying Roman food, researching Roman Gods and making sandals and aqueducts.

This week we were very excited to have the opportunity to visit Ryde Academy for a taster day on Friday. We have had a fun week starting our new unit of learning in Science and particularly enjoyed investigating water resistance through carrying out a fair test. We also realised the importance of repeating our fair test and taking more than one set of measurements each time. Can you think why this might be? (If not, don't worry, as we can explain it to you!) In our English lessons, we have carried out more thoughtful descriptive writing, in role, as one of the characters in The Highwayman poem (Tim the Ostler). We are recognizing that effective description is specific, using words deliberately chosen to create a powerful description, rather than generic adjectives such a 'nice", 'good', 'lovely', or 'nasty'. We have also carried out some assessments this week and are pleased to see how much more confident we are in Maths through the fluency work we carry out each morning, before starting our Power Maths sessions. We also feel impressed with ourselves because of how much Spanish we are learning. At present, we are learning to describe our aches and pains, so that if we visit Spain and feel poorly, we can clearly communicate what is wrong. We have also been trying to work out what might happen in the end of our class novel. It is very exciting and we can't wait to see how the plot resolves!



This week in Yen class we completed our mock SATs. We answered questions on grammar, punctuation and spelling. We read three interesting texts and answered questions about them. We finished the week by completing an arithmetic test and two reasoning papers! Our teachers were very impressed with our resilience. We also carried out a Mission Possible challenge. We were asked to create our own school trip. We had to find transport, accommodation and food. We then created a letter to parents sharing the cost of our trip. We had to create a PowerPoint to share our trip with the rest of the class. We will vote for the trip we most want to go on!
